The Bible

The Bible is a collection of 66 books.
The two largest divisions of the Bible are the Old Testament (OT) and the New Testament (NT).

The Bible Structure

The Bible has two parts:

- The Old Testament
- The New Testament
- The word testament means "*covenant*", which is a compact or agreement between two parties.
- The 39 books of the Old Testament tell about the agreement between God and His chosen people, the Israelites (or Hebrews, or Jews).
- The 27 books of the New Testament tell about the covenant or agreement between God and the rest of humankind through the life of Jesus and His followers.

The Old Testament

Traditionally, the books of the **Old Testament** have been divided into 4 sections:

The Content of the Bible

- Some of the titles of books of the Bible are based on the books' *content*. For example the book of Exodus tells of the Israelites' departure from slavery in Egypt, Esther tells of a queen who helped save the Israelites in a time of trouble, the book of Acts tells of the acts of the apostles.
- Some of the books take their titles from their author. Example, the book of Daniel was written by Daniel.
- Some of the books get their titles from the people who received the piece of writing in the first place. Example, the book of Romans is a letter from Paul to the church in Rome.

The Books of the Bible

- The Bible is not like a novel that runs from chapter after chapter in a neat lineal progression. There is a lot of overlap. Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy all deal with different aspects of events relating to Moses and the lives of the early Israelites.
- The books of the Bible cover a range of time periods:
- 2 Chronicles -384 years Judges – 335 years Ezra – 81 years Nehemiah-14 years Jonah – 1 month New Testament – 100 years
